# McCorkle Reading and Conversation at the Sewanee Inn

Every summer the School of Letters invites our acclaimed faculty and other prominent, nationally recognized writers and scholars to read their work and speak about the writing life.

In partnership with Tower Community Bank, the School of Letters presents a reading and conversation with author Jill McCorkle on Thursday, June 20, at 5:30 p.m at the Sewanee Inn on University Avenue. Event parking will be available in the Sewanee Inn lot. Overflow parking may be found across the street in the Hall Street lot. A reception will follow, and the University Bookstore will have the author's books for sale during the reception. We ask that those in attendance please RSVP via our website, <letters.sewanee.edu>.

Jill McCorkle has six novels published — most recently published is "Hieroglyphics" (2020, Algonquin Books) — and five collections of short stories ("Old Crimes," 2024). Five of her books have been named New York Times notable books and four of her stories have appeared in Best American Short Stories. An essay, "Cuss Time," originally published in The American Scholar, was selected for Best American Essays. Mc-Corkle has received the New England Booksellers Award, the John Dos PassosPrize for Excellence in Literature, the North Carolina Award for Literature, and the Thomas Wolfe Prize; she was recently inducted into the NC Literary Hall of Fame. McCorkle has taught at Harvard, Brandeis

University, NC State University, and the Bennington Writing Seminars. Following a reading, McCorkle will be in conversation with Barry Allen and Jamie Quatro. Allen is the president and CEO of Tower Community Bank. The bank's mission includes serving and supporting the South Cumberland community. Allen is the creator of The Impact Code, a podcast focusing on people who have made an impact on the summer concerts taking place world around them and the journey they undertook to find their path. Quatro is a School of Letters professor whose latest novel "Two-Step Devil" will be published in September 2024.

At 4:30 p.m., Wednesday, June 19, at Naylor Auditorium, there will be a Faculty and Alumni Reading with Nickole Brown and Lindsey Harding, L'11.

Nickole Brown is the author of "Sister," first published in 2007 with a new edition reissued in 2018. Her second book, "Fanny Says" (BOA Editions), won the Weatherford Award for Appalachian Poetry in 2015. "To Those Who Were Our First Gods," a chapbook of these first nine poems, won the 2018 Rattle Prize, and her essay-in-poems, "The Donkey Elegies," was published by Sibling Rivalry Press in 2020. She's also a fellow of the Black Earth Institute and is the President of the Hellbender Gathering of Poets, an annual environmental literary festival set to launch in Black Mountain, N.C., in October of 2025.

Lindsey Harding directs the Writing Intensive Program at the University of Georgia, where she earned her PhD in English in 2015. Her nual July 3 Street Dance, at Angel recent flash fiction and stories have appeared in Lost Balloon, CRAFT, apt, Spry, and Prick of the Spindle. She lives in Athens, Ga., with her husband and four children. Her novel "Pilgrims 2.0" follows four

At the June 10 meeting the Franklin County School Board recognized Nissan for its contributions to the Franklin County Schools and heard an appeal from Jonanne Hammer, 2023-2024 music teacher at Clark Memorial Elementary, representing Arts Ed Matter FC, a Franklin County arts-education advocacy organization. The board approved the School Fees schedule for Franklin County and Huntland high schools and authorized Huntland to move forward with plans for a regulation size soccer field on city property. 



Known as TAG (Tennessee, Alabama, Georgia), the region is prized by cavers for its well-decorated caves with stunning karst formations and challenging caves accessible only by rappelling.

"My late husband and I moved to Sewanee in 2004 for the caves," said 30-year caver Martha Mills, a third time NSS convention staff member and 12th time attendee. "Many people don't realize caves vary from one area of the country to another. Cavers come to convention to attend workshops and sessions on cave conservation, exploration, and science, to socialize with other cavers and to explore the caves there."

Handler described the NSS Convention as "summer camp for cavers." There will be vertical rope climbing contests, a caver obstacle course, storytelling contest, a "Welcome Party" band and dancing; lectures on cave diving, cave geology, biology, and archeology, and caver culture; accounts of domestic and international cave exploration and expeditions; as well as workshops on vertical caving techniques, cave surveying, cave formation repair techniques, and cave photography. Onsite vendors will offer cave gear, cave related books, caver swag, and local rock specimens

set in earrings and necklaces.

The NSS is the largest caving organization in the world," Handler said. "We are dedicated to the exploration and conservation of cave resources and to education about caves and the need to protect them in order to protect our groundwater resources." The local cavers group the Sewanee Mountain Grotto has undertaken several cleanups of dumpsites where the watershed threatens fragile cave ecosystems. The Grotto's service project, recycling aluminum cans from Caverns' concerts, finances regional and national cave conservation and preservation efforts.





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# 'Birth of a Flower': An **Abigail Warner Painting Demonstration**



Sewanee Athletics Director John Shackelford has announced that Karine Gordy has resigned as the Director of Sewanee's Equestrian program and Head Equestrian Coach after 10 years.

"Karine Gordy has served our equestrian program, the many student-athletes who benefited from her wisdom and guidance, and most importantly the horses and animals that thrived under her care, admirably for over a decade," said Shackelford. "The University loses a real treasure, not simply a dedicated employee, or a successful coach, but a friend to those who cross her path, and a teacher of those secrets we may not fully understand until we travel the trails and pastures that are her home. The barn will be a little more empty for some time to come. She has left a saddle that is not easily filled."

Gordy has led the Tigers to two regional championships, a Reserve Conference Championship in the inaugural year of NCEA, and two NCEA National Championship Appearances in the past three years. During her tenure, she has also coached two Cacchione Cup riders, an All-American, two ODAC Rookie of the Year riders, and seven IHSA Individual National Championship contenders.

"I am very grateful to have had the opportunity to work at the Howell Equestrian Center," said Gordy. "For a school of this size to support a top-class facility like Sewanee has is truly amazing. Getting to work with the horses each day has been a joy. It has been a privilege to coach talented riders and I have made lifelong friends along the way."

In the Intercollegiate Horse Shows Association (IHSA) competition, Gordy has led her team to 16 high-point finishes and 16 reserve high-point finishes since the 2017 season. Sewanee started a National Collegiate Equestrian Association team in 2020, with Gordy leading her team to a 5-10 record.

"Karine has been an indispensable contributor to this program since her first day on the mountain," said assistant coach Aeline Hill. "She leaves an impact on all student-athletes who have ridden with her, and I am honored to have had her as a coach, a mentor, and a boss. I am forever grateful for every ounce of energy that she has poured into me as both a student and now a coach."

This past season, Gordy coached an All-American and two ODAC Rookie of the Year Riders in both fences and flat. The NCEA team made it to the semifinals of the NCEA Championships, the IHSA won their region and sent an individual to compete in the IHSA Individual Regionals where they placed 8th.

"Karine's passion for the amazing animals that we work with is unparalleled," said Hill. ### Slime Molds and High Desert

Lin Cameron sent this: "Here's a small wonder-Honeycomb slime mold (Metatrichia vesparia) — found along the Perimeter trail near the cross-easily overlooked." Be sure to look at the photo online to see the amazing orange color. Many slime molds have no individual cells but multiple nuclei. Recent research has shown them to have amazing abilities to learn, solve problems, and pass

We are currently visiting family in the High Desert of central Oregon. The humidity is so low that everything appears more sharp and clear than we are used to and the sky is a brilliant blue. We are surrounded by conifers, which add a briskness to the air — Ponderosa Pine, Lodgepole Pine, and Western Juniper. The still snowcovered mountains of the Cascades stand boldly on the horizon. It is so dry that I saw for the first time a phenomenon called virga, where the rain falls from the clouds but evaporates before reaching the ground, leaving, in this case, trailing gray veils. This week we were able to drive part of the Cascade Lakes Scenic Highway and stop at Sparks Lake, touted as the most scenic of the Cascade Lakes and eminently photographable. The rugged shoreline of lava rocks frames South Sister, Broken Top, and Devil's Garden Mountains as well as Mt. Bachelor. On some of those lava rocks were numerous brilliant white anemones (Drummonds?) and a clump of Pacific Bleeding Heart. The surrounding trees were Lodgepole Pine, fir (subalpine?), and Douglas-fir.






### Father's Day
