## Scott Wilson Named Provost of the University

Vice-Chancellor Rob Pearigen has announced the appointment of Scott Wilson as provost of the University, effective July 1. The Board of Regents approved his appointment at its meeting on campus last week. Wilson has been serving as acting provost since January 2022.

Scott Wilson began his work in the provost's office in 2019, first as assistant provost for global and strategic partnerships, and then as vice provost for planning and strategic initiatives, beginning in March 2021.

"Having worked closely with Scott for more than a year and reflecting on his recent invaluable contributions to the University, I am confident that Scott will continue to provide the leadership, vision, and wisdom to help Sewanee reach its full potential," said Pearigen.

Wilson chaired the Strategic Planning Committee that led the development of a strategic plan that was endorsed by the Joint Faculties and Staff Partnership Council. He was also instrumental in setting forth a set of operational priorities that will support the strategic plan and enable its success. He has also taken responsibility for the University's fifth-year interim accreditation report to the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges. Addi-

tionally, he co-led special committees to evaluate and improve access to employee housing on campus.

Along with his administrative service, Wilson has extensive experience in the classroom and supporting the University's academic mission. He was associate dean for global citizenship, the founding director of the Asian Studies Program, chair of the Politics Department for 12 years, and has been a member of the politics faculty for 30 years, having served as the Alfred Walter Negley Professor of Politics from 2013 to 2022. He is the author of two books and several articles on Chinese politics and development.

## SUD: Audit, Line and Leak Insurance, Billing

Sewanee Utility District received rave reviews on its 2023 audit. Addressing the board of commissioners at the June 18 meeting, MG Group principal Mark Crawford cited SUD's "extremely healthy" net position. "You're to be commended and [manager] Ben Beavers especially," Crawford said. "We very seldom see a utility district that has this much money." In regular business, Beavers updated the board on aspects of the billing software transition and changes in line protection and leak insurance that could impact customers.

As was the case for SUD's 2022 audit, there were no negative findings. "The staff was extremely cooperative and great to work with,"

Crawford commented. SUD's finances showed an \$105,000 net position increase. Crawford noted that SUD has "one big customer," the University, which accounted for 31 percent of the utility's revenue. "It's something to keep an eye on," Crawford said. He also recommended SUD consider consulting "legal counsel" about the agreement with the University governing the Wet Lands project, since the five year contract expired in 2021. Beavers said he had discussed the expired agreement with project leader biology professor Deb McGrath. "They are aware they are in arrears."

Reporting on the transition to

## MGTA Awarded Grant for Innovative Trail Paving

The Mountain Goat Trail Alliance (MGTA) has been awarded a \$352,000 grant under the Tire Environmental Act Program (TEAP) by the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation. The grant will be used to construct connector trails between the Mountain Goat Trail and the South Cumberland State Park Visitor Center and between the trail and the Fiery Gizzard trailhead in Tracy City.

"We're excited to use this new porous pavement on two sections of the Mountain Goat Trail, and to help reduce the number of tires in Tennessee landfills. Our thanks to TDEC and the TEAP program for choosing us to be a part of this innovative initiative," said Patrick Dean, executive director of the MGTA.

The trail sections will use Porous Pave, a 50/50 mix of stone and recycled tire rubber, instead of asphalt. Porous Pave allows water to soak through, avoiding issues such as tree root intrusion and frost heave. The sections will utilize more than 8,000 tires which would otherwise go to landfills in Tennessee.

Construction on the two sections is scheduled for later this year.

## Monteagle Proceeds with \$1.9 Million Rehab Project

"This has needed done for a long time," said Monteagle Mayor Greg Maloof following the Monteagle Council's approval of a resolution to proceed with a sewer rehabilitation project estimated to cost more than \$1.9 million. The rehabilitation work will remedy inflow and infiltration (I&I) of groundwater into the sanitary sewer system. I&I puts strain on Monteagle's wastewater treatment plant and costs the town money. The plant must treat the groundwater in addition to the wastewater from residences and businesses.

The council voted to adopt the resolution at a Special Called meeting on June 12. The resolution awards the contract to do the work to the Goodlettsville-based underground utility contractor SBW. SBW's \$2,079,587 bid included \$170,000 in sewer rehab I&I work for the Monteagle Sunday School Assembly. "The town is not on the hook for any of the work done in the Assembly," stressed Monteagle Alderwoman Jessica Favaloro. MSA will pay for the sewer rehab work done there.

Monteagle will receive \$303,600 in grant funding from the Appalachian Regional Commission and \$913,086 in American Recovery Plan grant money administered by the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation, for a total of \$1,216,686 in grant allocations. Monteagle will be responsible for the remaining balance, \$692,900.

The town has undertaken extensive video inspection of the sewer system to identify the flaws. At a meeting in June of 2023 Monteagle engineer Travis Wilson said most of the flaws could be repaired with cured-in-place-pipe (CIPP) installation. The trenchless CIPP process costs \$65-\$70 per foot compared to \$250 per foot to dig up the lines for repair. Wilson estimated the I&I rehab work would take a year.

# Obituary

## WJ “Railroad Bill” Crescenzo

WJ “Railroad Bill” Crescenzo, age 75 of Sewanee, died on June 6, 2024, at STHRS-Sewanee. He was born on May 16, 1949, in the Bronx, N.Y., graduated from Mount St. Michael High School in the Bronx and from St. Bonaventure University, New York. He also spent time at Loyola University, New Orleans. At St. Bona, as result of his charity work with underprivileged children in Olean, N.Y., he was known affectionately as “Uncle Bill.” He arrived in Sewanee in 1979, and was a fixture on the Mountain, having developed relationships across many generations of Sewanee residents, students, and faculty. He worked for the University of the South as a lab supervisor for the Physics Department, and as technical adjunct for the Forestry and Geology Departments. Pulling from his bio, outlined in the Sewanee Mountain Messenger as part of his candidacy for a position on the SUD Board (January 2020), he was a founding member of the Tennessee Recycling Coalition and a founding director of the Sewanee Recycling program. He participated in Governor Ned McWherter’s Solid Waste Roundtable, promoting legislation mandating convenience centers in each county. He served five terms on the Save Our Cumberland Mountains board, two as vice president. He also served with the Sewanee Volunteer Fire Department, and was a member of the Sewanee Senior Citizens’ Center board. His moniker “Railroad” stems from his years as a freight conductor on the Penn-Central Railroad.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Fred and Hazel Crescenzo of Yonkers, N.Y., his beloved dog Strider, and several descendants of Strider, all of Sewanee.

He is survived by his sister, Michele (Andrew) Federico.

the new billing software, Beavers said, "This will be the first month that we're reading meters and billing with it." Customers will be able to pay through the new web portal. As a result of the transition, customers should be aware bills may be mailed four days later than usual.

SUD's customer-insurance provider Servline was recently bought by HomeServe, Beavers said, taking up another circumstance that could impact customers, in this case in a very positive way. With the provider HomeServe the cost to SUD customers for basic leak protection will remain the same, \$1.30 per month, but with additional benefits, covering several circumstances not previously qualifying for bill adjustments: leaking faucets, running toilets, water heaters and faulty customer plumbing. Unless they opt out, all customers have leak insurance, covering them for up to \$1,000 in high water bill expenses caused by leaks.

Line protection, offered to customers for an additional fee, will also change slightly, Beavers said. Line protection covers repairs to lines outside the home, at a cost of \$4.40 per month. Going forward, for customers who make a claim, HomeServe will manage the transaction, rather than SUD, and send a plumber from the insurer's approved list to do the repair. SUD will mail a letter explaining the change to the 40 customers with line protection insurance.

In other business, Beavers said he recently discussed the Regional Drought Plan with Monteagle Mayor Greg Maloof. The area water utilities will update the Regional Plan, which has not been updated since 2011. Pointing to significant changes since 2011, Beavers said Tracy City raised their dam, doubling their water capacity.

# NATURENOTES

## Recent Reports

John Palisano submitted this: "I am fascinated with photographing striped wintergreen (also known as spotted wintergreen or pipsissewa) flowers. Plants with one to three flowers are very common in the Sewanee area. Occasionally, I find a striped wintergreen plant that has three flowers. Very rarely, I see a plant whose peduncle or flower stalk bifurcates with four or five flowers; two or three flowers on each bifurcation but never three flowers on both bifurcated flower stalks on the same plant. Because this plant had more leaves than most, I had to entertain the fact that I might be looking at two plants so close together it looked like one plant. Consequently, I followed the flower stalk to where it splits and confirmed with photographs that it was indeed a single plant with a bifurcated flower stalk with six flowers."

We continue our visit in Bend, Oregon. Recently we spent some time walking along the Deschutes River there. It drains much of the east side of the Cascades and flows into the Columbia. In the past it has been perhaps the most stable river in the country as the snowmelt from the mountains enters the volcanic landscape and slowly percolates into the river. We enjoyed seeing tree swallows swooping over the waters and a platform nest, most likely of an osprey, at the top of a broken off Ponderosa pine. We heard but did not see a pygmy nuthatch, which is a bird of these Ponderosa pine forests on the east side of the Cascades. Some of the interesting wildflowers were woodland pine-drops (a relative of Indian pipe), western columbine (very similar to our eastern columbine), silverleaf phacelia, and a lupine. Shrubs such as red osier dogwood and chokeberry were in bloom—definitely a prime time to be in this part of the country.

For those who didn't already hear, a black bear was photographed recently walking down the highway in the vicinity of the South Cumberland State Park Visitor's Center!

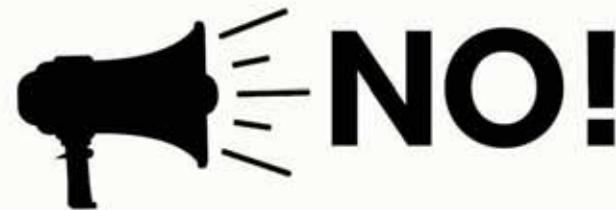
