# Monteagle Launches 'Monteagle Classifieds' **Community Email Service**

Headed up by Martha Ann Pilcher and Iva Michelle Russell, Monteagle has launched a community email information service modeled after Sewanee Classifieds. At the June 24 Monteagle Council meeting, the community received information about how the service worked and how to sign up. In regular business, Mayor Greg Maloof announced July 4 parade plans. The council approved purchase of body cameras for the police department, a resolution authorizing an updated Drought Plan, increasing court costs, and a building-permit fees schedule.

The Monteagle Classifieds email service provides a central repository for information on upcoming events; weather alerts; fire, police and 911 notices; school, Monteagle City Hall, Chamber of Commerce, and local business announcements; lost dogs, cats, and people; items offered for sale or trade; items people are in search of; recommendations for physician, carpenters, plumbers — all the everyday things people want to know about. Pilcher explained people complained about not knowing about events or meetings until they had passed. "Not everyone reads the paper," Pilcher said. "Not everyone is on Facebook." To sign up for the no-charge email service, contact Pilcher at <maspilcher@ gmail.com>. To read recent posts and post announcements without signing up for receiving Monteagle Classifieds emails in your inbox, use a search engine to visit Mon-teagle Classifieds-Google Groups. Pilcher also chairs the Beautifi-

cation Committee which is raising funds to purchase an electric digital sign for Monteagle Elementary School and planning a Christmas tree lighting event for the holidays. Email Pilcher to get involved.

# **NATURENOTES**

Here is a final report from our time in the High Desert of Central Oregon. This past week we walked a trail in Shevlin Park along Tumelo Creek, an area where John Fremont and his expedition crew camped in the winter of 1843 after mapping the Oregon Trail. Away from the creek, the vista is of an open, savannah-like Ponderosa Pine forest. The size of some of those pines is amazing! Closer to the creek is a situation similar to that at our Fiery Gizzard Creek, where "the cold canyon microclimate ... explains the presence of conifer trees that would normally grow only at higher elevations"- grand fir, Engelmann spruce, and western larch (quote from park signage). Along the trail was a greater diversity of flowering shrubs and herbaceous plants than I would have expected, as well as occasional stands of scouring-rush. Some were "kin" to familiar wildflowers of our area that I was not able to ID to species: cinquefoil, yarrow, vetch, pussytoes, rock cress, Solomon's plume, chickweed, and beardtongue. Others were more particular to the area: lupine, Indian paintbrush, and red columbine. Some of the flowering shrubs were black twinberry (a honeysuckle), red osier dogwood, bitterbrush, and a rose. We had hoped to catch a glimpse of the American Dipper or Water Ouzel but no luck. We heard the ubiquitous and persistent Western Wood-pewee, and heard and actually saw the Yellow-rumped Warbler, also known as "Butterbutts," which flashed for us its bright yellow rump.




