# Tracy City Receives \$2.1 Million Trail Grant

The Town of Tracy City, in partnership with the Mountain Goat Trail Alliance has been awarded a \$2.1 million grant from the Transportation Alternatives program of the Tennessee Department of Transportation. The grant will be used to extend the Mountain Goat Trail almost two miles, from downtown to Firetower Road north of Tracy City.

"The Mountain Goat Trail has been a great asset for Tracy City. We're excited to partner with the Mountain Goat Trail Alliance to extend the trail and give people even more access in our town to walking, running,

and cycling," said Tracy City Mayor Nadene Moore. The MGTA has recently completed a section of trail connecting Tracy City to Monteagle, bringing the total distance of completed Mountain Goat Trail to almost 12 miles. Planning is underway for construction of the trail through the I-24 intersection, from its current terminus at Mountain Outfitters to Tower Community Bank.

The Mountain Goat Trail is a rail-trail initiative to build a 40-mile walking and cycling path along the route of the historic Mountain Goat Railroad, from Cowan in Franklin County to Palmer in Grundy County. For more information go to <https://www.mountaingoattrail.org>.

### Monteagle: CD Purchase Approved; Rate Increase **Tabled**

At the Oct. 18 Monteagle Council Special Called meeting, the council agreed to move forward with an 18-mothh \$677,000 certificate of deposit investment. The council tabled the water tap fee rate increase in order to collect more information, given the difference between the proposed rates to the rates of neighboring municipalities.

At the September meeting, two council members questioned moving the \$677,000 from a money market to a 36-month CD, since the town might need the funds before the term ended for water tank rehabilitation. At the council's request, Mayor Marilyn Campbell Rodman investigated the interest on an 18-month CD. The approved CD investment will yield 2.25 percent, an increase of more than a percentage point from the current money market investment.

Taking up the proposal to increase water and sewer service rates, Utilities Manager John Condra said some of the fees were too high, particularly the fee for a 2-inch commercial tap. Alderman Nate Wilson observed Monteagle's proposed fee was 20-30 percent higher than Tracy City and Big Creek, but well below Sewanee.

"Is the concern we would price ourselves out of market?" Wilson asked. "There's too much variation," Alderwoman Dorraine Parmley said. The council will revisit the proposed rate increases after collecting more information.

She is also the author of the memoir "Memorial Drive" (2020). Her book of nonfiction, "Beyond Katrina: A Meditation on the Mississippi Gulf Coast," appeared in 2010. She is the recipient of fellowships from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Guggenheim Foundation, the Rockefeller Foundation, the Beinecke Library at Yale, and the Bunting Fellowship Program of the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Study at Harvard. 

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### **AMENDMENT 1**

#### To the Editor:

Vote yes on Amendment 1 on the ballot in November. This addition to the Tennessee Constitution will enshrine the current law that makes it illegal for a prospective worker to be denied employment due to membership in, affiliation with or previous affiliation with any labor union or employee organization. The law also prohibits the requirement to join a union in order to get the job, thus "right to work."

I was voluntarily a union member for 32 years. Membership, and thus dues-paying, should be at the employee's discretion, not a condition of employment. Private sector unions have an important place in our society, but membership should not be mandatory to hold the job.

It's also wrong to be forced to pay dues to an organization that may then endorse political candidates holding views morally repugnant to an individual. With no right-to-work protection, one could face a choice between deeplyheld beliefs and putting food on the table.

Nothing in the amendment or law precludes employees from joining or forming a union to negotiate pay and working conditions, it just prohibits mandatory union pdf>. membership or denial of a job due to membership. I urge you to read the actual text and vote to add this right to Tennessee's Constitution. Bill Kershner, Sewanee

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### Proposed Amendment **No.** 1

As proposed by SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 648 (111th) & SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 (112th) <https://publications.tnsosfiles. com/acts/112/resolutions/sjr0002.

Summary:

This amendment would add a new section to article XI of the Tennessee Constitution to make it illegal for any person, corporation, association, or the State of Tennessee or its political subdivisions to deny or attempt to deny employment to any person because of the person's membership in, affiliation with, resignation from, or refusal to join or affiliate with any labor union or employee organization. Question:

Shall Article XI of the Constitution of Tennessee be amended by adding the following language as a new section?

It is unlawful for any person, corporation, association, or this state or its political subdivisions to deny or attempt to deny employment to any person by reason of the person's membership in, affiliation with, resignation from, or refusal to join or affiliate with any labor union or employee organization. 



### **Rotary Reading Boot Camp**

Monteagle-Sewanee Rotary Club volunteers and some sorority and fraternity students from the University of the South, Sewanee completed the first iteration this academic year of the Fluency Boot Camp at Monteagle Elementary School, with the help and support of Principal Veronica Rogers Horton and Fluency and Reading Intervention Specialist Kim Parton. Of course, the heroes were the kids. The success of this initiative was thanks to the coordination and scheduling efforts of Rotarians Martha Krenson and Kathy Henslee.

This service project was started earlier this calendar year, April 2022, and led to an average increase of 9 percent in reading proficiency of first, second and third grade kids. As a result, the Monteagle-Sewanee Rotary Club joined again with Monteagle Elementary School to duplicate that success this academic year. After a short session of training, every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, 15 volunteer Rotarians, community members, and students sat down with two kids each, for about 20 minutes to practice reading accuracy and speed. The students' excitement at meeting with their partners was always palpable. They elbowed each other to get to the volunteer assigned to them. But most exciting were the volunteers' stories and emotions. One Rotarian volunteer, not quite 45 years old, was assessed by one of his charges to be 73. When the volunteer showed disappointment, the kid altered his assessment to 69, just to appease the volunteer. One student volunteer was seen almost in tears at the awards ceremony, pictured here, and told me, "I wish we could do this all year long." Her sentiment is duplicated by all volunteers. The next iteration of the Fluency Boot Camp will be in February

2023. Meanwhile, we await the results of the beautiful labor of love and the success of these kids. Without reading, everything in school is difficult: word problems, homework, test directions. Sister Eliseea Papacioc is an internationally-known iconographer and a nun in the Romanian Orthodox Church. From her home in the village of Bradetu, located in the foothills of central Romania, Sr. Eliseea creates an impressive portfolio of icons, several of which have been exhibited in Moscow, Beijing and New York.

For many centuries, icons have played a significant role in the spirituality of Christians in the Eastern Orthodox Church, serving more than as simply religious paintings, but as windows into the divine. In recent years, icons have grown in popularity and spiritual significance for many in the Western Church. According to journalist Andreea Câmpeanu, "Sr. Eliseea's iconography has caught the attention of experts and enthusiasts around the world as much for its exquisite detail as for its unique style."

Sr. Eliseea was raised in a devout Orthodox family, during the mid-20th century when the ruling communist regime attempted to crush Christianity and all who practiced the faith in Romania. Both her father and uncle were imprisoned. Her father, an Orthodox priest, did not survive imprisonment and her uncle, an Orthodox bishop, suffered lifelong disabilities. Sr. Eliseea, her mother and brother endured severe ostracism and deprivation during this period of communist oppression. After the fall of communism in Eastern Europe and the rebirth of the Orthodox Church and the spiritual arts, she and other Romanian artists were discovered by the West.

The Smithsonian Institute first brought Sr. Eliseea to the United States to take part in its annual Folklife Festival in 1999. Soon thereafter, she returned to the US and has several exhibits at the John Paul II Cultural Center in Washington, D.C. Her patronage has expanded to include not only museums and churches, but also private commissions.



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### NATURENOTES

#### **Backyard Birds**

The backyard birds where we are staying in Bend, Ore., are actually very similar to those at home. The yard is full of Western Junipers, very similar to our Eastern Red Cedars. They are full of the blue, berry-like cones and various birds are feeding on them, especially American Robins, which are common all over the United States. Another familiar and widespread bird, the House Finch, greets us with song in the morning, though the song does sound somewhat different. Their native range is the West, but they have successfully become established in the east since a few birds were released on Long Island. Also spotted, appropriately, is the Cedar Waxwing, since, as the name indicates, they love to feed on cedar "berries." The bird feeders attract chickadees, but they are Black-capped Chickadees, not the Carolina Chickadees that we usually have. The most exciting, and definitely different, bird, was a Common Raven, though they are in fact not all that common. In trying to track down an unusual croaking sound, we found it was coming from a raven at the very top of a juniper. In the East, they are only found in the northernmost parts of the States and in the mountains, so it was a real treat to see one.






